For example, we have a very limited number of new pictures of our residents and staff since healthy distance kept us apart and not gathering for our typical celebrations. Those gatherings are central to the way we deepen our mission, our relationships, and our ability to do our day to day work. I missed that.

But, we pray we're over this one, and now must evaluate and see what we have learned about ourselves, our participants' needs and resourcefulness, and the new opportunities to keep some of these changes. I think that's a good way to reflect on 2021. Our title of this report **Some See a Weed, Some See a Wish**, is significant as we reflect.

With all we face in our every day lives, how do we choose to observe - what do we see? Our perspective determines our attitude and how we move forward. The dandelions pictured, a very common weed, are carriers of nearly 200 seeds each. Many see them as a nuisance; spreading seeds and creating even more of these resilient plants. But many more see them as wish carriers, carriers of hope. What is your view in these days?

I recently came across a song by Sara Thomsen, Song Like A Seed, which you will see in its entirety throughout this report. This excerpt, I believe, reflects what we each need to contemplate and celebrate:



AFFORDABLE HOUSING **FOR EVERYONE**

The cost of living index for Long Island is 47% higher than the national average.

The fair market rent is \$2,035. That means a household needs to earn \$81,390 per year or \$39.13 per hour to afford a basic two-bedroom apartment without spending more than 30% of income on housing expenses. To put that in perspective, a full-time minimum wage worker in New York working 40 hours a week, 52 weeks a year, is \$27,456.00 per year.

Creating more affordable housing on Long Island is a challenge. With the expense of rezoning properties for these projects being an expensive, years-long process with no guarantee of a favorable result and often community backlash, developers are discouraged from considering affordable housing projects.

Mercy Haven believes that housing is a basic human right and essential for mental and physical well-being, especially for our most vulnerable community members. We provide affordable housing to your neighbors, who have lived here their whole lives, who have support networks here, and who struggle with various circumstances. The opportunity for safe, stable housing is what we create.



BREAKTHROUGH

After its COVID hiatus, Breakthrough returned to a full, in-person session in August 2021, yielding 6 graduates.

SUPPORTED EMPLOYMENT

Twenty-four residents worked for Mercy Haven in 2021 in various capacities: working in our community food pantry, completing agency bulk mailings, program transportation, and maintenance assistants. Some residents earned wages assisting our Supportive Housing Program in clearing out empty apartments & houses and getting them prepared for new residents.

REAP

Fourty-four residents attended our REAP (Resident Empowerment and Achievement Program) monthly activities, which include educational, recreational, relationship building and life skills development classes.

GROWING TOGETHER COMMUNITY GARDEN

COMMUNITY FOOD PANTRY

We have a formal collaboration with Long Island Cares, the Harry Chapin Food Bank. Our Food Pantry is open two days a week to anyone in-need in our community, providing perishable and non-perishable nutritious food options. Donations to the pantry are always needed and welcomed!



"OUR LIFE"

Mercy Haven offers regular education, social and recreation opportunities to our growing family and youth population. For families who were previously homeless and possibly living with mental illness, this program is critical to their stability and wellness. It offers mentorship, behavioral and emotional support, as well as parent education.

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Mercy Gardens Opens

Our beautiful, newly constructed complex in Central Islip, Mercy Gardens, officially opened in 2021

In 2016, Mercy Haven began the demolition of 3 neglected homes on Adams Road in Central Islip. On that property, two beautiful, brandnew homes were built; one that has 14 single apartments for persons living with mental illness, and the other which has 5 units for homeless families and individuals.

Mercy Gardens provides a perfect space where staff can provide vocational, educational and recreational programs for residents. Mercy Haven's Main Office and Community Garden are very close, providing more access to the supportive programming they will need.






HOUSING & MENTAL HEALTH

Through 2021, staff participated regularly in phone calls, meetings and email campaigns concerning advocacy for the homeless, low income renters, and supportive housing. This included the National Low Income Housing Coalition's (NLIHC) 'HoUSed' campaign, advocating for stable and affordable housing for renters with the lowest incomes, and the Supportive Housing Network & NLIHC Capital Hill Advocacy Day, where organizations discuss decisions that affect their populations with elected officials. With the Association for Community Living's 'Bring It Home' Campaign, we advocated for better funding for mental health housing.

Measuring Our Impact Over Time

Mercy Haven, like all other nonprofits, tracks important statistics throughout the year to measure our success and where improvements are needed. Standard agency-wide trackers are reviewed quarterly and include such metrics as budget results, fundraising results, grant income, employee turnover and staff and resident satisfaction.

Leadership and staff thoroughly track key indicators across all housing programs that fall into 5 significant categories and measure our ability to effectively improve these health and recovery outcomes through the combination of services and stable housing:


- Improve housing stability through independent living skill development to increase preservation of stable housing
- Improve behavioral health by developing life skills and providing resources to reduce psychiatric hospitalizations and substance abuse
- Improve medical health by developing life skills and providing resources to reduce medical emergencies
- Improve economic stability and self-sufficiency by developing life and vocational skills to increase competitive employment and income
- Improve food security by expanding Mercy Haven's food pantry and our nutritional resources

Strategic Planning

The planning process included analyzing our Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats. competition, and agency performance.

Results of the analysis were used to create clear strategic goals, objectives and deadlines through 2024, focusing on:

- Strengthening our financial sustainability
- Establishing an agency culture focused on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI)
- Developing a system to increase agency growth
- · Creating an environment that fosters staff development, satisfaction, and retention

Highlights HOUSING OUTCOMES

- Total Number served in 2021: 286 individuals, including 60 children were provided housing and services across our housing programs. 221 in Supportive Housing, 42 in our Community Residences and 23 in our Adult Home. Mercy Haven managed 75 Section 8 housing vouchers in 2021. 98% of our Supportive Housing residents have been with us for 6 months or more; an 8% increase from last year.
- *Personal Progress:* We have seen an increase of 40% in the number of Community Residence population that qualified for more of an independent living model. There were four successful transitions in 2021.
- **Development:** A multi-home project for eight families fleeing domestic violence was underway in 2021. Construction and renovations were completed in two out of three homes in 2021. Mercy Gardens, our 19 unit newly constructed housing complex, officially opened in Central Islip.

SUPPORT ACHIEVEMENTS

- Breakthrough, our homeless outreach program, returned to full in-person sessions in August. Our total number of graduates to date is 283.
- Our Resident Empowerment and Achievement Program (REAP), providing monthly educational, recreational and social activities,
 was maintained virtually and then in-person again starting in June. The events, skills and topics that were covered in these series
 were rated highly by all participants in 2021.
- 62 residents maintained employment in 2021, and there was a 31% increase in individuals that gained employment outside of Mercy Haven.
- The Mercy Advocacy Program (MAP), Mercy Haven's legal service program, preserved or won a total of \$111,817 for residents in-need, including \$9,963 in food stamp benefits. MAP opened 21 new cases in 2021, making the total cases opened 3,073 since its start in 1997.
- With 91% of our adult population living with mental illness, psychiatric stability is key to recovery and progress. Mercy Haven is pleased to report an increase in stability to 93%, measured by the percentage of residents living with mental illness with no psychiatric hospitalizations in 2021.

VITAL FUNDRAISING

This year we celebrated our 36th Anniversary Gala with tremendous success thanks to the generosity of our volunteers, supporters, donors and friends. The combination of gifts-in-kind and gifts of time and money made this past year one of the greatest yet. Our Gala, 21st Annual Golf Outing and our successful Resort Drawing contributed as well to the successful year in fundraising.

IMPACTFUL OUTREACH

- Our Community Food Pantry, originally an emergency food pantry created for residents
 was opened formally to the community in October 2021. Within three months, the food
 pantry served 13 families in our surrounding communities and 31 individuals and families in
 our Supportive Housing Program.
- Staff worked hard to educate residents and their families on the importance of COVID vaccines. We are happy to report that by year-end 2021, 70% of our total residents across housing programs are fully vaccinated.
- Mercy Haven, along with other mental health agencies, worked together with the Association
 for Community Living's Bring It Home Campaign to advocate for higher funding for mental
 health housing. As a result, the approved 2022-23 budget secured the largest ever 1-year
 investment for New York State mental health housing programs, providing vital funding
 needed for support services and staff retention.














WHAT'S TO COME?

A rise in mental health and housing crises on Long Island

More than 53,000 New Yorkers have died from COVID-19, leaving friends and family members mourning.

Millions of New Yorkers have lost employment or income over the course of the pandemic, plunging families into food insecurity and housing instability.

The impact of this loss of life, prolonged economic hardship, and societal upheaval has had, and will continue to have, a profound impact on the mental health of New Yorkers.

Meanwhile, Long Island faces a number of housing challenges, including a shortage of affordable and rental housing, housing costs, an exodus of young adults, and meeting the housing needs of a growing elderly population.
